- Repeal of Sections VII to XII that present administrative structures that have never been used in ASF.

«The Water Law» recent shock-documentary

Robert Monderie, the assistant director of Richard Desjardins documentary L'Erreur boréale (The Boreal Error), is now implicated in the big problem of water management in Quebec.

The director starts his film by discussing the commercialization of water. He explains how the World Water Council affiliated with the World Commerce Organization, are presently working on the first steps toward the commercialization of water. That is –putting a price on water. The next step, will be to ask governments to give money to the poor to enable them to buy this life essential. As you can see, they have not yet convinced governments to accept the idea of privatizing water.

In this film we learn that Quebec will never run out of water since the evaporation of the ocean deposits one metre of water onto Quebec territory each year. Quebec has more drinking water than any other territory in the world. Thus the growing interest in exploiting our water. There are now about 40 factories collecting water; they remove about 440 million litres of water a year. If we take into account the number of permits given out by the Ministry of the Environment, the number of factories will increase tenfold in the near future.

The real problem according to Robert Monderie is that we don't

know the expanse of the underground water system. For this reason we should be cautious about the management of this precious resource. In the past few years, many citizens' groups have manifested their disapproval of the exploitation of water. In 1997, the Bouchard government set up the Beauchamp Commission (Public Hearings on the Environment) in order to obtain a sense of public opinion on the topic.

One important question that comes out of the documentary is « Who does the water belong to? ». André Denis, a Franklin citizen, states « Water isn't a resource to sell. It is like air, we can use it as long as we don't make it into merchandise. Allowing it to be bottled in industrial quantities is giving our water to people who have little respect for what that means. » Then, Louise Vandelac of the group Eau-secours (Save the Water) of Montreal describes the paradox that we are in: « We give water to the big companies and they sell it in small plastic bottles for 150 million dollars a vear. ».

Water Pollution

Next, Monderie encourages us to reflect on the pollution of water in Quebec. According to Dr. Henri-Claude Lavallée, professor of chemical engineering at the University of Quebec in Trois-Rivières, there are only 70 companies out of 2200 that are regulated. There is no systematic follow-up and very little information is available about the pollution

created by these factories. The Ministry of the Environment doesn't talk about it and people think that everything is fine. Even though certain companies openly state that they are not respecting environmental norms, no action is taken by the Ministry of the Environment.

There are thousands of polluting substances that are dumped into our water. According to Michel Fournier, professor of Immunotoxicology at the INRS, many of these substances could undermine the work of certain natural hormones during embryonic development. These substances could create developmental problems like: sterility, malformations of the genitals etc.

Agricultural water pollutants (pesticides, fertilizers, herbicides) added to the industrial pollution, have resulted in certain malformations in frogs living near the waterways into which the « agricultural soup » has been dumped. Many species of fish have disappeared from these waterways in the past thirty years.

In conclusion, the author tells us that there is no water law other than the law of silence. He adds it is in our best interests to reconstruct the Ministry of the Environment. André Beauchamp closes in saying, « The Ministry of the Environment's vague knowledge of many of these documents about the politics of water is rather disturbing. »

United Farming for viable agriculture

On Janaury 29, 2002, I attended the first Townships meeting of the new agricutural organization called l'Union Paysanne (United Farming). This group proposes an alternative to the existing agricultural industry which is based on mass production at all cost, creates farm-factories and uses farming technics (chemical fertilizers, liquid manure, pesticides, single crop farming and mega-stockbreeding) that are pushing us toward agricultural disasters, the contamination of drinking water and the devestation of rural areas.

According to the President of the Board of Directors of the organization, Roméo Bouchard, in order to make this necessary change towards viable agricultural farming, we must collectively create a policy of agriculuture based on the following objectives:

- · control of foodstuffs
- safe foodstuffs
- diversity of foodstuffs and organic foodstuffs
- dynamic possession of the countryside
- protection of the rural environment
- quality of life for farmers, country dwellers and consumers

To reach these objectives the most urgent measures to be taken are the following :

- encourage small farms and local marketing to stop the industrialization of farms and the exodus of rural inhabitants
- guarantee the quality of foodstuffs and the environment
- restore rural citizenship

United Farming is not against United Agricultural Producers (UPA) and is certainly not against farmers. Rather, it is against the agricultural business interests that free-trade imposes on farmers and other citizens, to their detriment. The group is in favour of a pooling of everyone's en-

ergy to participate in the construction of an alternative to the present situation of unhealthy foodstuffs and the desertion of the countryside.

Declaration of Principles of United Farming

(Note: what follows is not an official translation. Taken from the French language internet site www.unionpaysanne.com

UNITED FARMING's goal is to create an organized, collective force representing everyone interested in agriculture and farming to counter balance the monopoly of union representation and the powerful agricultural industry lobbyists and promoters of free-trade who favour a big business model of agriculture.

UNITED FARMING advocates two key elements: self sufficiency of agriculture in order to provide the population with healthy and diversified foodstuffs while respecting nature, the soil, the animals, the environment and the community; and the possession of the countryside in order to ensure the maintenance of many farmers on the land.

UNITED FARMING favours an agricultural system which supports and encourages :

1.Automomous, diversified, small scale farming, creating local jobs, easily transmitted and not larger than approximately 100 animals or 100 hectares or \$200,000 in business.

2.Transformation and marketing on the farm or in small businesses either local, regional or specialized.

3.Agricultural practices that respect the soil, the animals, the environment and the health of human beings. Some of these practices are:

- · crop rotation
- grazing of livestock and their access to the outdoors
- management of manure, use of litter and composting of manure
- limiting the number of animals to the capacity of cultivated land
- protection and conservation of agricultural biodiversity
- protection of waterways and underground water, woods and the countryside
- collective management of watercourses
- self suffiency of nourishment for farm animals and a list of permitted nourishments and " intrants " excluding meat and bone meal, hormones and antibiotics as growth stimulants
- elimination of products of synthesis, GMO, patents on living creatures and the irradiation of food
- taxing of " intrants " that bring about social and environmental costs including energy

4.The enlarging of the status of producer, agricultural programs and production structures and the marketing (joint projects, quotas, regulations, agricultural credit, zoning etc.) to make room for new producers, for young people, part time farmers, producer-transformers, selling on the farm, local agriculture and agricultural diversity.

5.Rural democracy which gives back to all the rural citizens the power to develop their land and to speak openly about local industrial projects by decisional referendums.

UNITED FARMING also favours local management of forestry and fisheries in order that the profits from the exploitation of these resources is not reserved for big exportation businesses but allows local citizens, living where the resources are, to benefit from their existance and development in diverse companies on a small and family scale. Inshore fishing and the surrounding forest should be reserved for local exploitation.

UNITED FARMING believes that to achieve these objectives, it is necessary to re-establish free unions in the agricultural world and to modify the law which authorizes only one association to represent farmers,

La belle saison

"Alana, where were you Saturday morning? I called early thinking I'd catch you at home. You don't work on Saturdays."

Well actually I do. Sort of. Well, no it's not really work. Well, let me explain. I was in the forest on a river bank, the gurgling of the water calming my ears, the fresh scents of nature stimulating my nostrils, the feel of the damp earth under my feet and hands, a simple task temporarily liberating my mind from personal preoccupations.

You see between May and October on Saturday mornings, I am doing the action of Action St François. I meet with a group of like minded individuals in a downtown parking lot before 8 AM. I often arrive around 7:50 on my bicycle

dressed for bush-whacking; that is to say, long sleeves, long pants, boots and a hat. We stand around socializing and wondering who else will show up. Sometimes we are merely three or four. Sometimes ten or more. At 8:00 the signal for departure is given. We pile into the available transport (not everybody arrives on a bicycle) and drive off in single file to our destination. We clamour out of the vehicles. find a "pair" of gloves (well one for each hand anyway) and listen while the instructions are clarified for newbies - different bags for glass, metal, plastics and junk and BE CAREFUL. We grab a few bags and head for the slopes. Some people choose to work in tandems, chatting as they go.

I often work alone. There is something about the " no brainer " task and being in nature that allows

you to just be yourself -no competition, no performance record. That's when it happens- the peacefulness I described earlier. Even when we are hefting huge pieces of car carcass up the incline in a human chain. Even when we are fighting with rolls of metal fencing that want to unroll or fall to pieces. Even when we must return week after week to the same site because there is so much debris to be removed. Even when the working conditions aren't perfect, there remains a sense of awe at what can be done in these few hours to assist in making the world a better place.

So don't call me on a Saturday morning between May and October unless it is pouring rain or you want to come with me to discover what this volunteer action might mean to you.
